

HENRY GRANT PLUMB.

Painter and Former Art Teacher at
Cooper Union for 34 Years Dies.

Henry Grant Plumb, painter and art teacher, died yesterday at his residence, 195 Claremont Avenue, in his eighty-fourth year. He left a daughter, Margaret, and a son, Henry G. Jr.

Mr. Plumb was born at Sherburne, N. Y. He studied at the Cooper Union from 1864 to 1868 and at the same time worked as an apprentice for the Hatch Lithographic Company, then at 111 Broadway. He completed his professional education at the Ecole des Beaux Arts in Paris, 1874-78, going abroad after ten years of lithographic work here and in Boston. The most important association of Mr. Plumb's career was with Cooper Union. He taught freehand drawing there for thirty-four years, from 1882 until 1916. His paintings have been shown at the Paris Salon and he won honorable mention at the Paris Exposition of 1889. He belonged to the Salmagundi Club.
